Summary of Piping Plover (and Least Tern) Monitoring Plan Town of Harwich Provided by Mass Audubon's Coastal Waterbird Program

As per the USFWS and MA NHESP Guidelines for Managing Recreational Activities in Piping Plover Breeding Habitat on the U.S. Atlantic Coast to Avoid Take Under Section 9 of the Endangered Species Act, monitoring and protection of a site by Coastal Waterbird Program (CWP) staff in cooperation with the Town of Harwich will include:

- Mass Audubon will provide full time staff which are: are trained biologists or staff working towards a degree in biology/environmental science/wildlife management, who work 7 days/week, and who receive consistent training and in the field oversight throughout the season by the Director and/or Assistant Director of CWP.
- Permission to access, monitor, and (if determined appropriate by NHESP) place symbolic fencing
 on private sites will be obtained by the Town of Harwich, prior to April 1 or as territorial plovers
 or terms are observed.
- Potential/historical habitat for piping plovers is delineated and symbolically fenced/signed (twine string and warning signs) prior to April 1, as determined by NHESP.
- Each year, prior to April 1, a qualified shorebird monitor, approved in writing by the NHESP, shall determine whether territorial or nesting Piping Plovers are present at beach nourishment areas along the Harwich coastline (approximately 4 miles), eastward from Grey Neck Road to Red River Beach.
- If these species are observed, warning signs and symbolic fencing will be immediately erected
 and maintained to protect nesting habitat and nests from disturbance or human-caused mortality.
 Town and/or Mass Audubon staff will routinely check the condition of the fencing and will
 maintain it as necessary.
- If, over the course of three years, nourishment material placed at a site erodes to the extent that
 qualified shorebird monitors determine there is no suitable nesting habitat available because of
 erosion, Mass Audubon will notify the Town and NHESP.
- Monitoring shall occur no less than 2 times per week until at least July 1st, if no territorial Piping Plovers or Least Terns are found. However, if plovers are found to be using the site, then monitoring frequency shall be increased to at 3-7 times per week thereafter. Daily monitoring (dependent on weather) is the goal, especially when territorial pairs are present and during nest searching periods. Fencing is adjusted in response to nesting locations and response of incubating birds to pedestrian or other disturbance. Monitoring shall continue until all nesting and brood-rearing activity has been completed.
- exact locations of Piping Plover and Least Tern nests and hatch dates will be provided, as requested by the Town of Harwich, MA-NHESP or USFWS.

- The site is monitored at least 5 times per week during chick rearing period and chicks are located when at 25 days, or when they can first fly >50 ft to determine fledging success.
- Causes of nest loss are carefully documented and nesting chronology tracked to determine when and if pairs will renest.
- On beaches where pedestrians, joggers, sun-bathers, and other recreational users are present in numbers that could disturb or harm incubating plovers, their eggs, or chicks, an area of at least a 50-meter radius around nests above the high tide line (where possible) is delineated with warning signs and symbolic fencing, adjusted as needed in response to renests, storms, and disturbance.
- On beaches where nest predation is a concern, exclosures may be used where appropriate and determined to have a potential benefit to nesting plovers.
- If nourishment is to occur after April 1, Mass Audubon will provide a qualified monitor to be present on the beach to ensure that no Piping Plover or Least Tern nests, chicks or adults are disturbed during any beach nourishment activities (actual nourishment, transport of pipes to and from beach, grading of material, and heavy equipment access), as permitted by MA-NHESP.
- Numbers of pairs, productivity, and nesting chronology is submitted to MA NHESP on their state census forms, along with maps of nest locations. Reports shall be submitted to the NHESP each year, on or before September 30, on standard census forms provided by NHESP, that summarize the results of site-specific monitoring and protection efforts.

Dear Mr. Melvin:

The Town of Harwich in cooperation with Massachusetts Audubon (Mass Audubon) Coastal Waterbird Program submits this letter to clearly identify our commitment to monitoring and protection efforts of the Piping Plovers as part of the above referenced project. Such efforts are required in order to meet the requirements set forth by the MA Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program (NHESP) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to insure protection of rare shorebirds that may use the project area for breeding activities.

Accordingly, the Town of Harwich in cooperation with Mass Audubon commit to implementation of the following action items as part of the Harwich Beach Nourishment as part of the 3 Year Comprehensive Dredge/Beach Nourishment, to be renewed upon approval by both parties in Sep 2013:

- Each year, beginning April 1st, a qualified shorebird monitor, approved in writing by the NHESP, shall determine whether territorial or nesting Piping Plovers are present at beach nourishment areas.
- If these species are observed, warning signs and symbolic fencing will be immediately
 erected and maintained to protect nesting habitat and nests from disturbance or humancaused mortality. Town and/or Mass Audubon staff will routinely check the condition of
 the fencing and will maintain it as necessary.
- Monitoring shall occur at least 2 times per week until at least July 1st. However, if
 plovers are found to be using the site, then monitoring frequency shall be increased to at
 least 3 times per week, and shall continue until all nesting and brood-rearing activity has
 been completed.

- A report shall be submitted to the NHESP each year, on or before September 30th, on standard census forms provided by NHESP, that summarizes the results of the state – listed species monitoring and site protection activities.
- NHESP will be notified of the monitoring arrangements before January 1st of each year for written approval.

An initial step towards implementation of the action items cited will be provided through a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Town and Mass Audubon Coastal Waterbird Program. This MOU outlines the partnership between the Town and MA Audubon to monitor and protect shorebirds, including monitoring expertise, material and financial support by the Town if needed and available. The Town will commit a minimum of \$5000 budgetary funding to support the current program; costs may exceed this amount and will be billed as appropriate, based on a signed contract and MOU between MA Audubon and the Town of Harwich. Please find attached the summary of Piping Plover (and Least Tern) monitoring provided by Mass Audubon's "Coastal Waterbird Program". The Mass Audubon's "Coastal Waterbird Program" meets or exceeds the conditions listed above.

It is anticipated that Audubon staff will commence annual monitoring activities, with the Town staff being available to monitor and install symbolic fencing as necessary.

Both the Town and Mass Audubon are aware of the magnitude of the effort that will be required to successfully assure the protection of shorebirds along the beaches of Harwich. We will work together to guarantee that monitoring and protection efforts are effectively implemented. COASTAL WATERBIRD MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT

Town of Harwich, MA

COASTAL WATERBIRD MANAGEMENT AGREEMENT dated as of May 18, 2010 (the "Agreement") by and between Massachusetts Audubon Society, Inc., a Massachusetts non-profit corporation exempt from Federal taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code with an address of Mass Audubon, 208 South Great Road, Lincoln, MA 01773 ("Mass Audubon"), and The Town of Harwich, Harwich, MA 02539 (the "Client").

WHEREAS, Mass Audubon, through its coastal waterbird protection program and activities, has expertise in coastal nesting bird monitoring and management; and

WHEREAS, Client desires the services of Mass Audubon to assist in monitoring and management of coastal nesting birds in conjunction with proposed beach nourishment at permitted locations including coastal areas along the south (Nantucket Sound) side of Harwich; and

WHEREAS, Mass Audubon through its Coastal Waterbird Program desires to perform such services for the Client; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual promises contained herein and for other valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Mass Audubon and the Client hereby agree as follows:

(1) Services:

- (a) The Client hereby engages Mass Audubon, through its Coastal Waterbird Program (hereinafter "Mass Audubon"), to perform the services described in Exhibit A attached hereto (the "Services"). Mass Audubon hereby agrees to devote its best efforts to the performance of the Services. All Services shall be performed by Mass Audubon at times that are mutually agreeable to Mass Audubon and the Client.
- (b) Either Mass Audubon or the Client may terminate the engagement of Mass Audubon under this Agreement at any time by giving written notice at any time to the other party stating its election to terminate this Agreement thirty (30) days after the date of receipt by the other party of such written notice. In the event of such termination, Mass Audubon shall be entitled to be paid through such thirty (30) day period and any compensation paid to Mass Audubon for services to be performed by

- Mass Audubon beyond such thirty (30) day period shall be returned by Mass Audubon to the Client. The terminating party shall also provide notice to Mass Wildlife, US Fish and Wildlife Service, MA Natural Heritage and Endangered Species Program, and the US Army Corps of Engineers.
- (c) Unless terminated by one of the parties as provided above, this contract shall be in effect as of the date it is executed and shall run through September 1, 2013.
- (2) <u>Compensation:</u> For the performance of the Services, the Client agrees to pay to Mass Audubon the compensation set forth in Exhibit B attached hereto in accordance with the payment schedule and procedures set forth therein.

(3) Indemnification:

- (a) Mass Audubon hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Client from and against any and all claims, liabilities, and obligations (including, without limitation, reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of or resulting from any material breach by Mass Audubon of this Agreement.
- (b) The Client hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Mass Audubon and its officers, directors, agents, volunteers and employees (including, but not limited to, the personnel of Mass Audubon) from and against any and all claims, liabilities, and obligations (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of or resulting from the performance by Mass Audubon of the Services. Mass Audubon assumes no liability or obligation for any omissions from any work performed for the Client.
- (c) Mass Audubon shall be an independent contractor, with the sole responsibility of directing the work of its employees to be performed under this contract. .Mass Audubon shall hold harmless the Client for any actions undertaken by Mass Audubon while on the Client's premises.
- (d) Mass Audubon agrees to carry all necessary insurance including, but not limited to, comprehensive general liability and Worker's Compensation and shall provide certificates of same to the Client. Mass Audubon will provide the Client with a certificate of Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees used to perform the work requirements of the Contract. Mass Audubon shall also provide a certificate of comprehensive general liability coverage with limits of at least one million (\$1,000,000) dollars coverage per occurrence and \$2,000,000 in the aggregate, wherein Client shall be named as an additional insured.
- (4) <u>Notice</u>: Any and all notices under this Agreement shall be in writing and, if to Mass Audubon, shall be duly given if sent to Mass Audubon by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, addressed to Attention: Katharine Parsons, Coastal Waterbird Program Director, Massachusetts Audubon Society, PO 8ox 275, Cummaquid, MA 02637, and if to

the Client addressed to the Client at the address set forth above. The primary contact person of the Client will be Tom Leach, and all notices under this Agreement shall be addressed to the Client to the attention of such person, with a copy to John Chatham, Town of Harwich Conservation Agent.

(5) Miscellaneous:

- (a) This Agreement or any of the rights and obligations under this Agreement may not be assigned in whole or in part by any party hereto.
- (b) The provisions of Exhibit A and Exhibit B shall be incorporated in this Agreement by reference as if set forth in their entirety in this Agreement.
- (c) Insofar as it pertains to said maintenance dredging and beach nourishment this Agreement shall be binding upon, and shall inure to the benefit of, the respective heirs, legal representatives, successors, and assigns of the parties hereto. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement of the parties hereto as to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all previous oral or written agreements between the parties hereto as to the subject matter hereof. This Agreement may be changed or amended only in writing signed by both parties hereto.
- (d) This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the internal laws of The Commonwealth of Massachusetts without regard to its conflict of laws principles.

EXHIBIT A

Description of Services

1. The Services to be performed by Mass Audubon for the Client shall be as follows:

Mass Audubon staff (one to two people, depending on extent of the project) will be available after disposal of sand as beach nourishment to monitor the presence of and minimize disturbance to state and federally listed coastal nesting birds (defined here as Piping Plovers, Least and Common Terns). The tasks involved in this work include, the following, according to state and federal guidelines:

- a) Pre- and/or during nourishment monitoring for the presence of nesting birds IF operations are taking place on or after April 1.
- b) Post-nourishment monitoring to determine the presence of nesting birds on all sites nourished at the start of this agreement, and for three summer field seasons beginning May 20, 2011.
- c) Post-nourishment monitoring and management, including symbolic fencing and signage to protect nests and scrapes, as needed, on all sites based on presence of potential nesting habitat and/or presence of birds, as determined by MA NHESP.
- d) Annual reporting to permitting agencies by September 30th of each year of the contract.
- 2. Client shall be responsible for all permitting and on-site maintenance work having to do with the maintenance dredging and disposal of sand.
- 3. Client shall give notice to Mass Audubon at least two weeks prior to the date of commencement of the project each year. Notice may be given by email or telephone to Dr. Katharine Parsons, Director, Coastal Waterbird Program, kparsons@massaudubon.org, 508-362-7475 x9351.
- 4. If necessary, and with appropriate notice (at least 48 hrs), Mass Audubon will undertake pre-construction operational monitoring within 48 hours prior to the scheduled start of operations and will continue monitoring during operations as needed based on the presence of coastal nesting birds at the site.
- 5. Client agrees to grant or secure for the personnel of Mass Audubon sufficient permission to enter private properties to permit Mass Audubon to perform properly the Services described herein for the Client. The Client shall immediately inform Mass Audubon if proper permission to enter the property or perform the proposed work cannot be obtained.

6. Mass Audubon is not obligated to perform any work beyond that described in this contract. If unforeseen circumstances results in the need to complete additional work, the parties will execute an amendment to this contract.

EXHIBIT B

Description of Compensation and Payment Schedule

The base annual fee for the Tasks in Exhibit A (above) is a minimum of \$5,000. This assumes time on the site for a qualified monitor billed at the rate of \$28/hour, plus travel to and from the site billed at \$0.45/mile.

If threatened coastal birds require additional monitoring, the cost for monitoring and reporting will be billed at \$25/hour, plus travel to and from the site at the rate of \$0.45/mile. The Client will be notified of the presence of coastal nesting birds prior to undertaking the work. All invoices will include an accounting of hours spent and mileage incurred. The additional cost will not exceed \$8,000/year.

The total due under this contract (base annual fee plus additional cost), shall not exceed \$13,000 in any one year period.

All payments will be due within 30 days of receipt of invoice.
