

# Selectmen Release Plan for Andrews River Area



in the Annual Town Meeting of 1957 the Selectmen were instructed to prepare a plan for a purchase or taking by eminent domain of the lowlands adjoining the Andrews River for boating and recreational purposes. As a result of hearings and discussions held during the past several months, the Selectmen have concluded that the above sketch best serves the interests of the Town and most accurately represents the wishes of those persons who expressed opinions. expressed opinions.

The Selectmen said it should be emphasized that the use of the land as shown is intended only as a suggestion. The shaded area indicates the filled portion

of the taking—the open area indicates the sections to be dredged and used for dockside mooring.

The irregular shape of the proposed taking results from the desire to include only the swampland and marshy areas, except where it was necessary to include upland for access purposes, the Selectmen said.

The two "fingers" or mooring areas extending into the northern end of the taking are approximately 225 feet wide and 700 feet long.

Estimates of the Town's share of the cost of such a project would depend largely on State D.P.W. quotations. Recent bids received by the State on dredging projects

have run from approximat to \$3 per cubic yard. O basis, the amount of the share of the cost of dredgin, entire area shown to a dept nine feet at mean low water or run anywhere from \$50,000 o \$150,000, the Selectmen pointed out. Additional dredging would also be necessary in the so-called "outer harbor" south of the channel. channel.

This plan would provide mooring space for from 200 to 250 boats of the average cabin cruiser size. The Selectmen said they will insert an article in the 1958 Town Warrant to authorize the above described purchase or taking.
